The Origins of Valentine's Day



Valentine's Day is celebrated every year on February 14th. In the United States, people exchange candy, flowers, and gifts with their loved ones as a tribute to Saint Valentine. The Catholic Church acknowledges at least three different saints with the name Valentine or Valentinus, all of whom were martyrs. One story claims that Valentine was a priest in Rome during the third century. When Emperor Claudius II determined that unmarried men made better soldiers than those with wives and families, he prohibited marriage for young men. Recognizing this unfairness, Valentine defied Claudius and continued to secretly wed young couples. When Claudius learned of Valentine's actions, he ordered his execution.

Others believe that it was Saint Valentine of Terni, a bishop, who truly inspired the holiday, and he too was beheaded by Claudius II outside Rome.

Other accounts suggest that Valentine may have been killed for attempting to assist Christians in escaping brutal Roman prisons, where they were frequently beaten and tortured. According to one tale, an imprisoned Valentine sent the first "valentine" when he fell in love with a young girl-possibly the daughter of his jailer-who would visit him during his imprisonment. Before he was executed, it is said that he sent a letter to her, signing it "From your Valentine," a phrase still used today.

Although the facts surrounding the legends of Valentine remain unclear, the stories highlight his image as a charming, noble, and romantic figure. By the Middle Ages, likely due to this reputation, Valentine had become one of the most celebrated saints in England and France.

From Start to Finish

The American College Test (ACT) is a vital standardized test for college admission in the United States. It serves as a robust assessment that measures your understanding of high school-level content. The ACT is scored on a scale from one to thirty-six, encompassing four key academic areas: English, mathematics, reading, and scientific reasoning, along with an optional direct writing test. Each section is scored out of 36 points, contributing to your composite ACT score, which is the average of these section scores. While the ACT is not mandatory for college admission, presenting a strong score can significantly boost your application. Many test-optional institutions still recognize the value of ACT scores in their admissions decisions. If you believe your ACT scores accurately reflect your academic capabilities and enhance your overall application, sending them is a smart move. Keep in mind that some colleges do require ACT scores, so it is essential to check each institution's specific guidelines. For more selective schools, scoring in the 24-28 range can enhance your chances of admission, but if you are aiming for highly selective colleges, targeting an ACT score above 30 will significantly strengthen your application. In 2024, the national average ACT score was 19.4, while the world average stood at 20.6. Locally, the average ACT score is devastatingly lower than both the national and world average, sitting at 18.6. So, Juniors, when you take the ACT on February 25, think about your future plans and how this three-hour test could impact not only your future but our school as well.

Research conducted by the National Climatic Data Center and the Canadian Weather Service revealed a disappointing accuracy rate of roughly 50 percent for Punxsutawney Phil. In contrast, Staten Island Chuck is said to have an accuracy rate of nearly 80 percent.

What Valentine's Means to Me





Expanding our Class Options





The history of Wayne Trace High School is a testament to the evolving educational landscape in Ohio. It all began with three distinct schools: the Payne Panthers, the Grover Hill Hornets, and the Blue Creek Komets. Each of these schools served their respective communities for many years, fostering a strong sense of local identity and school spirit among their students and faculty. However, as time progressed, aging infrastructure and other challenges led to the closure of these three schools. Recognizing the need for a consolidated educational facility, the state of Ohio decided to merge the three schools into a single institution; this new facility, Wayne Trace High School, is now situated on the site where Blue Creek was once located. The last classes to graduate from the original three schools were the classes of 1971 and 1972, marking the end of an era. In 1989, the 7th and 8th grades from Payne and Grover Hill Elementary Schools combined to establish a new middle school within the Wayne Trace building. According to Wayne Trace Local School District, "Over 400 Raiders attend Wayne Trace, and a total of around 900 kids are within the Wayne Trace school district today." The story of Wayne Trace Jr./Sr. High School officially began in 1972, yet its future remains

Imagine you are at a red stoplight and your friend shows you a video. You check it out, but when you drive off, you see police lights behind you. It is Sergeant Michael Ziehr, a state highway patrol officer, who has been out on patrol in Ohio for 13 years, and now resides at the Van Wert post, and you have just violated Ohio's cell phone law, which prohibits drivers under 18 from using a phone, even at stoplights unless it is mounted or in a position that does not distract. In 2024, the Van Wert Post of the Ohio State Highway Patrol issued around 5,200 tickets for various violations, including distracted driving and speeding. Sergeant Ziehr emphasizes the importance of avoiding distractions, as even small ones can lead to serious accidents. Driving is not just about skill; maturity and responsibility are crucial. especially concerning your passengers' safety.

Imagine you are driving a passenger who refused to put on their seatbelt when they got into the car. Now you are driving down a highway and all of a sudden instead of continuing forward your car is rolling off the road, you look to your right and witness your unbelted passenger fly through your windshield. To prevent this scenario as a driver, ensure your passengers wear their seatbelts before leaving; if you are a passenger, simply wear your seatbelt as correctly instructed. 




