Requirements for all students in the Class of 2020

Complete **20** course credits

Earn diploma through one of many options



Class of 2020 Graduation Options



At least 18 points on state tests;



Industry-approved credential and a work-readiness score on WorkKeys;



Remediation-free score on ACT or SAT; or



Meet temporary graduation options for the class of 2020

Modifications for the Class of 2020

- Attendance removed as criteria for Option 1
- GPA extended to Junior and Senior year for Option 1
- Capstone and Work or Community
 Service Experience must follow
 guidance developed by the Department

Option 1

Students entering grade 9 between July 1, 2016, and June 30, 2017, are eligible to utilize the modified graduation options below.

Students must take and pass courses that constitute the curriculum requirements and take all seven end-of-course exams. If the student receives a score of "1" or "2" on any math or English language arts test, the student must retake the test at least once.

Additionally, you must meet at least two of the below requirements:

- Earn a GPA of 2.5 on a 4.0 scale in all courses completed during the 11th and 12th grades (must complete at least four full-year – or equivalent – courses in each year);
- Complete a capstone project during 12th grade that meets criteria defined by Ohio Department of Education guidance and evaluation processes (guidance available by May 31, 2019);
- During 12th grade, complete a work or community service experience totaling 120 hours, as defined by the Ohio Department of Education and Governor's Office for Workforce Transformation (guidance available by May 31, 2019);
- Earn three or more <u>College Credit Plus</u> credits at any time during high school;
- Earn credit for an Advanced Placement (AP) or International
 Baccalaureate (IB) course and earn an AP exam score of 3 or higher
 or IB exam score of 4 or higher at any time during high school;
- Earn a WorkKeys exam score of 3 on each of three test sections;
- Earn a State Board-approved <u>industry-recognized credential</u> or credentials that equal at least three points;
- Meet OhioMeansJobs Readiness Seal requirements.



Capstone Guidance – Legislative Directive

- For the class of 2020, Section 3 of House Bill 491 (132nd General Assembly) directs the Ohio Department of Education to develop guidance for districts and schools that outlines the components of a successful capstone project and a process for evaluation.
- The guidance shall ensure that each capstone project is designed as a "culmination of the student's high school experience."

Work or Community Service Experience

Class of 2020:

HB 491 directs the Ohio Department of Education to work with the Governor's Office of Workforce Transformation to develop guidance outlining requirements for district or school approval of students' work or community service experiences, as well as requirements for verification of the work.

Approval of the Experience

- Description of proposed work or community service experience
- List of duties, responsibilities and learning outcomes
- Timeline or plan for completion
- Work or community service experience agreement

Class of 2020 Capstone and Work or Community Service Guidance

Students in the class of 2020 may complete a capstone project and/or a work or community service experience to satisfy components of Ohio's graduation requirements. For the class of 2020, state law directs the Ohio Department of Education to develop guidance for the Capstone and Work or Community Service criteria.

Work or Community Service

In accordance with state law, the class of 2020 Work or Community Service guidance document outlines the requirements for district or school approval of students' work or community service experiences, as well as requirements for verifying them. Additionally, the Department has developed a toolkit that districts and schools may use to support the implementation of this graduation option.

Capstone

In accordance with state law, the class of 2020 Capstone guidance document outlines the required components of a successful capstone project and a process that districts must follow to evaluate student work. Additionally, the Department has developed a toolkit districts and schools may use to support the implementation of this graduation option.

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Class of 2020 Graduation Options

State law did not extend the temporary graduation options to future cohorts.

The temporary graduation options available to the classes of 2018-2020 expire with the class of 2020.

Students in the classes of 2021 and 2022 will meet original three pathways or new requirements outlined in HB 166 that are required for the classes of 2023 and beyond.




STATE TESTING REQUIREMENTS – CLASSES OF 2023 AND BEYOND


- •For students who enter grade 9 on or after July 1, 2019, state and federal testing laws require districts to administer end-of-course tests to all students at the completion of the associated course. The required end-of-course tests include algebra, geometry*, English language arts II, biology, American government and American history.
- •Districts may adopt local policies that require participation on state tests in order to be promoted to the next grade level.



Ohio's High School Graduation Requirements







Demonstration of Competency













Students must meet two criteria – of which one must be foundational.

Foundational Demonstration:

- Proficient on 3 or more WebXams
- Earning an approved industry-recognized credential
- Pre-apprenticeship or apprenticeship program

Supporting Demonstration:

- 250-hour Workplace Experience
- WorkKeys
- OhioMeansJobs Readiness Seal

Criteria for earning these Seals is set by existing Ohio law, code or board



OhioMeansJobs Readiness Seal



Requirements:

- Demonstration of professional skills and competencies
- Students must have 3 mentors to validate the 15 professional skills needed to earn the Seal

Seal of Biliteracy

Requirements:

 The student must demonstrate proficiency in English and high levels of proficiency in at least one other world language

 Students can demonstrate proficiency in English and at least one other world language through a series of test-based options.



College Ready Seal

Requirements:

 Earn remediation-free scores on the ACT or SAT



Science Seal

Requirements:

Students can earn the Science Seal in one of three ways:

- Proficient on the Biology test; or
- Advanced Placement or International Baccalaureate; or
- Earning a "B" or higher in an approved CCP course





Requirements:

Students can earn the Citizenship Seal in one of three ways:

- Proficient on American History and American Government
- Advanced Placement or International Baccalaureate
- Earning a "B" or higher in approved College Credit Plus Courses

Citizenship Seal





Demonstration of Readiness





Requirements:

Students can earn the Military
Enlistment Seal in one of **two**ways:

- Providing evidence of enlistment in an armed services branch of the military; OR
- Participating in an approved Junior Reserve Officer Training (JROTC) program

Military Enlistment Seal





Technology Seal



Requirements:

Students can earn the Technology Seal in one of three ways:

- Advanced Placement or International Baccalaureate; or
- Earning a "B" or higher in an approved College Credit Plus course; or
- Completing a course offered through the student's district or school that meets guidelines set by the Ohio Department of Education

Industry-Recognized Credential Seal

Requirements:

In order to earn the industry-recognized credential seal, a student must:

Earn an industry-recognized credential that is aligned to a job that is determined to be "in-demand" in this state and its regions.







State law directs the guidelines for these seals be set by districts and schools.



Community Service Seal



Requirements:


- Completion of a community service project that is aligned with the guidelines adopted by the student's district board or school governing authority
- Other requirements are locally-defined, meaning that each school or district may construct requirements for their own specific program

Fine and Performing Arts Seal

Requirements:

 Demonstration of skill in the fine or performing arts according to an evaluation that is aligned with the guidelines adopted by the student's district board or school governing authority

 Other requirements are locally-defined, meaning that each school or district may construct requirements for their own specific program



Certified Student Engagement Seal

Requirements:

- Participation in extracurricular activities such as athletics, clubs, or student government to a meaningful extent, as determined by the guidelines adopted by the student's district board or school governing authority
- Other requirements are locally-defined, meaning that each school or district may construct requirements for their own specific program
