The Hunt

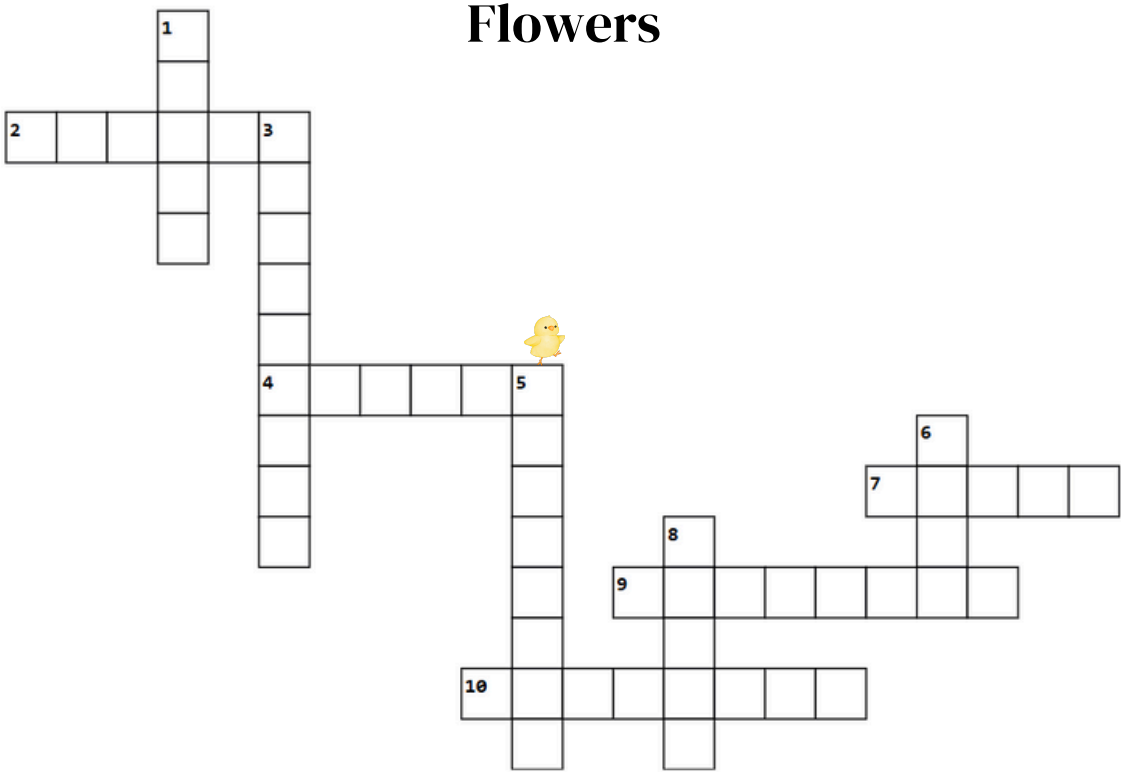

Rules of the Road

The most effective way to enhance safety in school zones is to maintain a reduced speed of 20 mph during designated hours when children are arriving at or leaving school. It is important to note that the enforcement of this speed limit applies even if the school zone sign is not flashing or if hours are not clearly posted.

Crossing guards, whether they are police officers or city-hired personnel, play a vital role in directing traffic in these areas. Their authority to manage traffic is recognized by law, and drivers need to follow their instructions, particularly when they signal for vehicles to stop to allow pedestrians to cross safely. It is important to understand that the commands of crossing guards take priority over typical right-of-way rules and traffic signals.

Additionally, when school buses are stopping to load or unload passengers, drivers must refrain from passing the bus, regardless of their location. This is critical as children may be moving to and from the bus from both directions, sometimes without being visible to approaching drivers. Ensure that all children have safely boarded or exited the bus and that the stop sign has retracted before proceeding on your way.

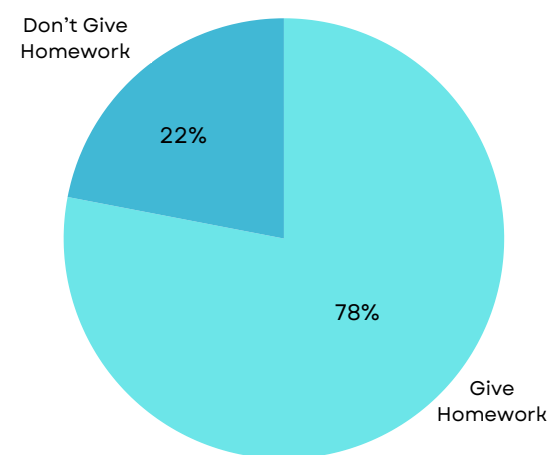

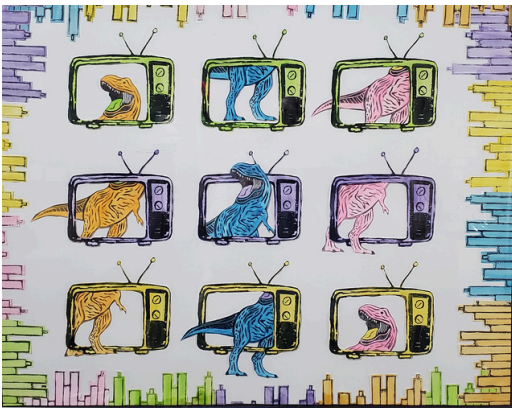
In shadows deep, where doubts reside,

Is proof of strength that conquers fear.

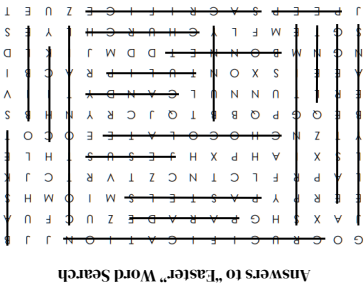
The road is long, the path is steep,

Keep going, sweet spirit, you're almost there.

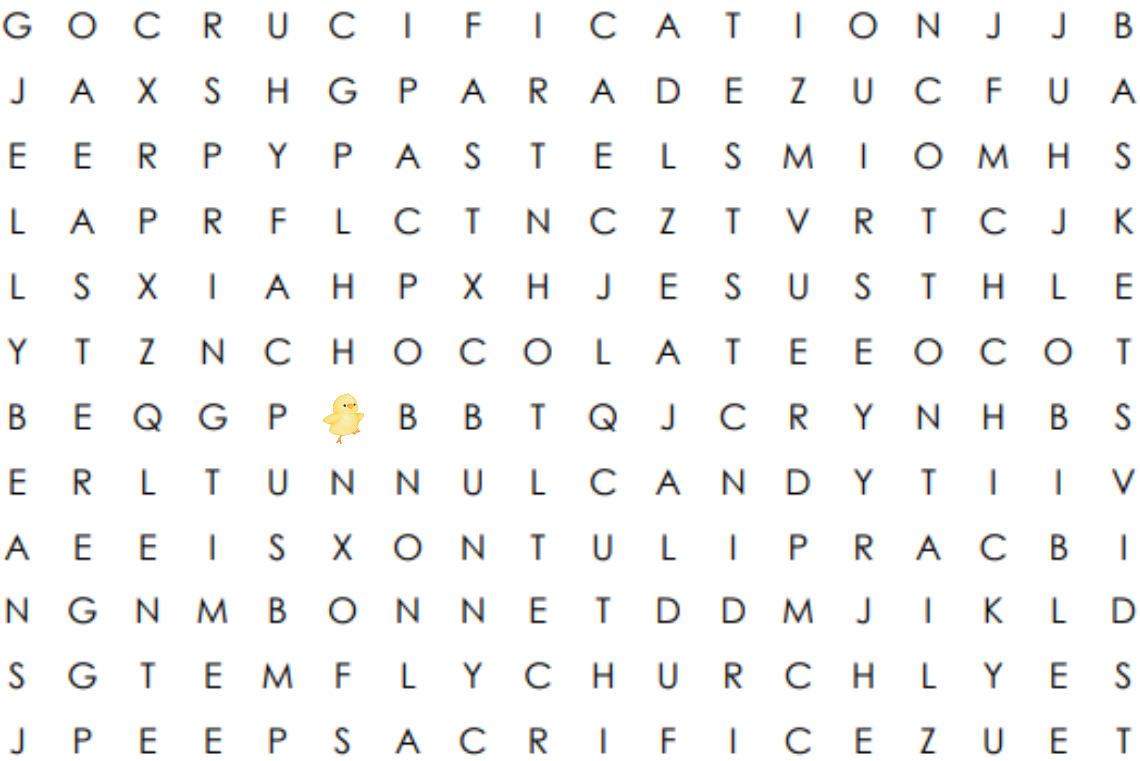

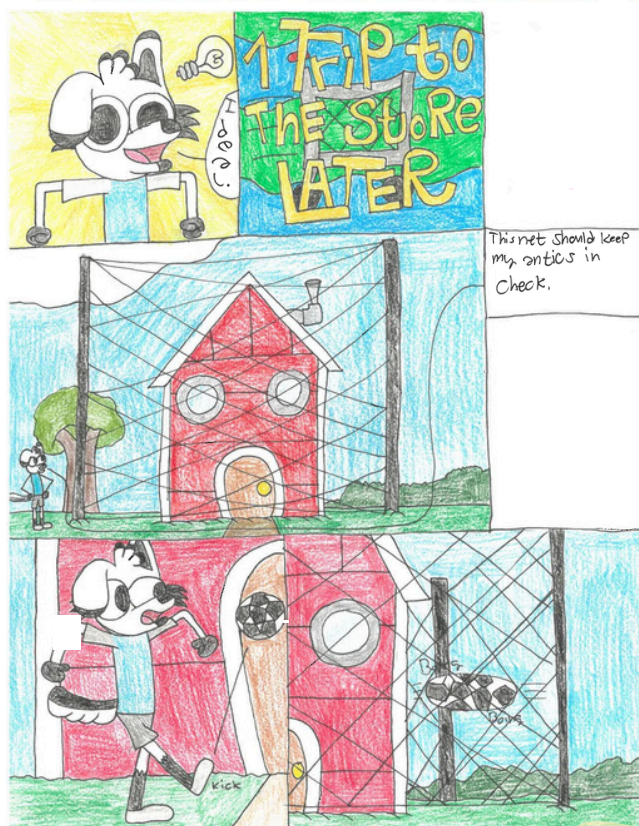
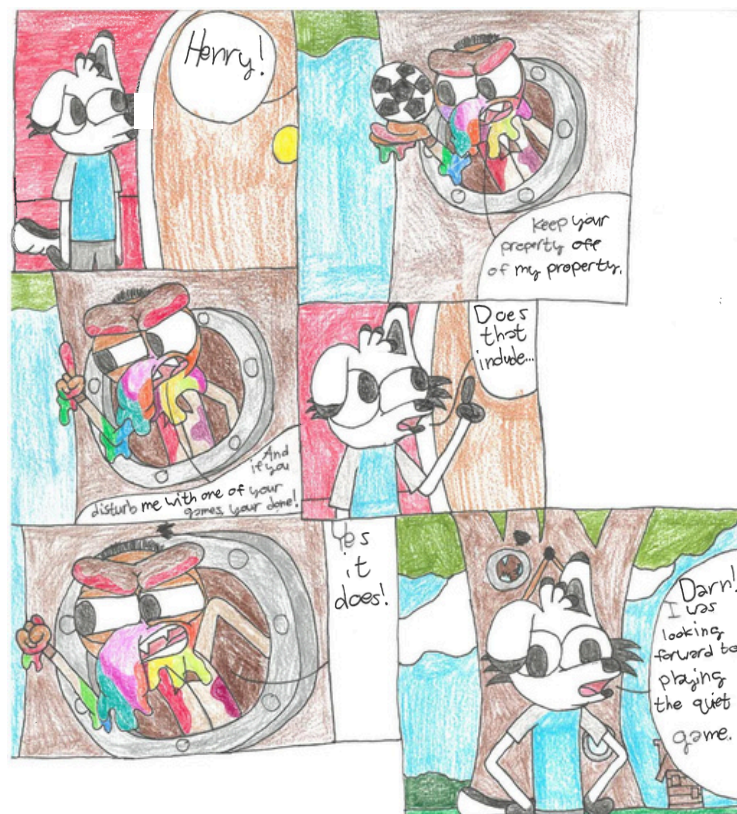
